#### Spanish Pronunciation: Attitudes, Perceptions, and Current Practices

The acquisition of L2 phonology has been extensively studied from both theoretical and experimental perspectives in the field of SLA. However, the number of studies that focus on the evaluation of pronunciation teaching methods and practices is significantly lower. This study aims to evaluate current attitudes, perceptions and classroom practices associated with Spanish pronunciation instruction. A total of 230 participants (100 high school students, 100 college students, 30 Spanish language instructors) completed a questionnaire that tested their general attitudes towards L2 pronunciation and elicited information regarding commonly used instruction practices. No specific methods were consistently used and explicit instruction significantly decreases after students pass the elementary language levels. These findings add to L2 pronunciation instruction, as a discipline that is currently in the process of being rebuilt, in order to provide efficient strategies that meet the challenges of current L2 learners.

### Connecting Proficiency and Performance: A Look at Oral Performance Interview at Foreign Language Program at Lewis University

What and how well can a student do after taking several semesters' foreign language courses? Instead of using standardized tests such as STAMP, MOPI to assess language courses at our program due to funding and other issues, an final oral performance assessment that involves a one-on-one interview between the instructor and students were developed with the considerations on the structure, levels and criteria of OPI in mind. This assessment mimics the interpersonal conversation in real-world that reflects the way students learn and provide a way to build and assess authentic communication without overwhelming beginning level students while helping the instructors to stay focused on teaching activities that will help to build and accelerate language proficiency.

# University Students' and Teachers' Views of the Role of Error Correction in Classroom Language Learning

Presenter: Teresa Bell, Brigham Young University, Provo, UT

In recent years the topic of student and teacher perceptions regarding effective language teaching and successful language learning has been the subject of a number of research studies. Because incongruities between student and teacher beliefs can be harmful to students' overall success in language learning, it is imperative for teachers to discover students' perceptions about language learning that are believed to facilitate successful language learning (Brown, 2009; Kern, 1995). This study takes the first step to bringing students' and teachers' perceptions of successful teaching and learning of languages closer to each other by comparing student and teacher perceptions of error correction in beginning language classes at a large Midwestern university. Student and teacher data were collected by means of questionnaires. The student questionnaire was administered to 2,495 students, and the teacher questionnaire was administered to 91 teachers. Results indicate that students and teachers are not in agreement about the role of error correction in the classroom. The author recommends that teachers explore students' beliefs about FL learning order to establish agreement and understanding about how languages can be learned and taught most effectively.

#### Teaching Culture from a Complexity Theory perspective

# Integrated Performance Assessment in Chinese Language Classrooms: Design, Implementation, and Feedback

Based on the characteristics and the cycle of Integrated Performance Assessment (IPA), this study reports the design and implementation of IPA in a college intermediate-level Chinese language class. It also reports the feedback from students on their experience with IPA. Students were asked to investigate a topic of their own interest, make a comparison between the U.S. and China regarding the topic chosen, give an oral presentation, and answer questions from their peer students. This assessment was design to evaluate students' communicative competency in three modes: interpersonal, interpretive, and presentational. A rubric was created based on the NCSSFL-ACTFL Can-Do Statements (2012). A semi-open-ended questionnaire was conducted to collect students' feedback.

#### Corpus Linguistics Applications in the Spanish-As-A-Foreign-Language Classroom

Foreign language students that read advance faster, and preschoolers need to hear stories before learning to read. Using hands-on strategies, tried-and-true literacy development practices, and a website called StoryJumper, Andrea Topash-Rios partnered her students with local preschoolers for a semester of growing together through reading. Using storytelling techniques, Tatiana Botero's students work with Latino families collaboratively to create, preserve, and document their life and path that led them to our community. This project enhances students' language skills and cultural awareness and understanding, developing intercultural competence and a reflective sensibility which opens possibilities, encouraging lifelong learning. In Rachel Parroquin's class, students coded qualitative data from a community partner; through carefully listening to audio files of native speakers, then reading and analyzing the transcripts, students gained confidence in their linguistic skills, engaged deeply with course content, and were motivated to do excellent work to benefit the community partner.

#### **Pragmatic Intervention for Study Abroad**

Presenter: Todd Hernández, Marquette University, Milwaukee, WI

The aim of this investigation was to measure the impact of a three-part pragmatic intervention given to six students during a six-week study abroad program in Buenos Aires, Argentina. The goals of the intervention were threefold: to draw second language learners' attention to the importance of language use and context through readings and discussion about pragmatics and exposure to authentic input, to make them aware of the pragmatic norms of the target culture and appropriate language use strategies, and to increase opportunities for target language practice and feedback. Results indicated that all six students increased their use of target-like request strategies over time. Journal entries and interviews with the researcher also indicated that the students became more aware of appropriate target-like request behavior as a result of the intervention. In their journals and interviews, the students also attributed their pragmatic development to three more sources: interactions with host families and other native speakers, to their participation in service encounter exchanges, and to the targeted feedback given to them by the researcher. The results suggest that explicit instruction and language practice prior to and during study abroad can facilitate pragmatic learning and, in turn, contribute to a more successful study abroad experience.

## An Etymological Approach: Effective and Meaningful in Teaching Chinese/Japanese Characters

Presenter: Sadatoshi Tomizawa, Ball State University, Muncie, IN

Characters are used in Chinese as Hanzi and in Japanese as Kanji in their writing systems. Approximately 3,000 characters have to be learned for one to be considered literate in these languages. However, no matter how complicated they are, each character consists of one or more

basic units of meaning called Bushou in Chinese and Bushu in Japanese. The purpose of this presentation is fourfold: (1) explain the importance of etymology- based character learning as an alternative to rote memorization, (2) through digital images, introduce some of the basic Bushou/Bushu with their historical and cultural meanings, (3) introduce samples of the etymological explanations of characters, and (4) recommend ways in which the knowledge of Bushou/Bushu and etymological explanations can be used for making materials that enable students to learn characters digitally. The author developed etymology-based learning materials in digital form for all Japanese Bushu and all Japanese characters introduced in the course text. This session is to share these Bushu with teachers of both Japanese and Chinese.

## **Digital Spanish: Teaching Heritage Students**

Delivered in Spanish, this presentation describes a blended course focusing on Spanish in the US that will expand the curriculum offerings for heritage students at a Midwestern university. The course hosted in Blackboard combines face-to-face instruction with distance learning technologies. Driven by pedagogically sound practices rather than technology, the course aims at further developing students' Spanish language literacy and assisting them in reconnecting with their heritage culture, thus, strengthening their multicultural and multilingual identity (Beaudrie, 2011). Blended courses afford a number of tools that are appropriate for differentiation in goals, tasks and pace as they tackle reading and writing assignments and tap into heritage community resources (Carrera, 2012). Additionally, they offer easy access to a wealth of high quality digital materials in Spanish that are culturally sensitive and appropriate for this particular student population.
